

Comma Rule #1 - use a comma to separate items within a list

Comma rule #7 – quotes must be set off with a comma

Comma Rule #2 – if you can replace *and* with a comma (and it still make sense), use a comma (between adjectives)

Comma Rule #8 - use a comma to signal that an independent clause is being interrupted

Comma Rule #3 – don't separate a subject and a verb with a comma

I like
cooking my family
and my pets.

Comma Rule #9 – use commas in addresses, dates, and large numbers

Comma Rule #4 – use a comma to separate independent and dependent clauses

Use commas.
Don't be a psycho.

Comma Rule #10 – use commas in the greeting and closing of a letter

Comma rule #5 – use a to set off an appositive phrase that begins with *which* or *who*



Comma Rule #11 – introductory prepositional phrases must have four words before a comma is needed

Comma Rule #6 – use a comma to set off contrasting expressions

Comma Rules #12 – sentences that begin with subordinate conjunctions must have a comma
